
Suicide in America

- In 2010, 38,364 deaths were due to suicide.¹
- Every 13.7 minutes, one person in America commits suicide.⁹
- More people die from suicide than homicide.²
 - For every 1 victims of homicide, there are 2 persons who commit suicide.
- Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death.²
- It is estimated that each suicide intimately affects at least 6 people.³

by age...


- Suicide is the third leading cause of death among 15-24 year olds.¹
 - Among 15 to 24 year olds, suicide accounts for 20% of all deaths.
- In 2011, 15.8 % of all U.S. high school students had seriously considered attempting suicide and 7.8% actually made a suicide attempt.¹
 - More white and Hispanic students crafted a suicide plan than African Americans.⁴
- Among persons aged 35-64 years, the suicide rate has increased 28.4% from 1999 to 2010.
- Suicide and the elderly...
 - The suicide rate for men increases with age, most dramatically after 65.⁶
 - White males over the age of 85 are at the greatest risk of all age, gender, or racial groups.⁶
 - The ratio of suicide attempts to completions narrows drastically with age, indicating that older individuals who contemplate suicide are more likely to complete it.⁶
 - In 2010, the elderly made up 13% of the population, but they accounted for almost 15.6% of all suicides.⁶
 - "Double suicides," involving spouses occur more frequently in the elderly population.⁷
 - "Silent suicides"
 - Often suicides among the elderly are under-reported because they are considered "medication overdoses" or "accidental deaths."

by gender...

- Suicide is the 7th leading cause of death for all U.S. men.⁸
 - Highest among white and American Indian/Native Alaskan men.
- Females attempt suicide three times more often than males.9
- While females report suicidal thoughts more often than males, there are 4 times as many deaths to suicide for males than females.¹
- In 2011, more female high school students reported seriously considering suicide, devising a suicide plan, and attempting suicide than did male students.⁴
- Men underreport depression and can be expected to underreport suicide attempts.
- Men may have higher rates of completed suicide because of their lack of strong social support and unlikelihood to seek psychiatric and medical help.



by race/ethnicity...

- From 1999 to 2010, suicide increased the most among American Indian/Alaska Natives and whites.⁵
 - Among American Indian/Alaska Natives, the suicide rate increased 65.2%
 - Among whites, the rate increased 40.4%
- The suicide rate among American Indian/Alaska natives aged 15 to 34 is 2.5 times higher than the national average for that age group.¹
- Among all ages, suicidal thoughts, plans, attempts, and deaths are significantly higher among AI/AN males than AI/AN females.11
